

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CREATING & A SMARTER HOME

started in the electrical industry over 20 years ago. Back then electrical technology was limited to how many power outlets you wanted in your home, and where you wanted your switches to be placed. Colour options weren't a thing, and USB powerpoints were not invented. If you were lucky, you had a manually triggered door switch in your pantry that turned your lights on when you were hunting for a midnight snack. Back then, this was considered smart.

Making standard switches smart

Jumping forward to 2016, we launched a new range of light switches in New Zealand called PDL Iconic. In 2017, we started introducing optional Bluetooth mechanisms as part of this range and revolutionised the electrical industry.

Essentially it meant homeowners could chose to turn their standard switch into a Bluetooth light switch. Then with the introduction of Bluetooth timer mechanisms this allowed them to turn a standard switch into a timer which has the ability to schedule appliances like heated towel rails or spa pools to come on and off at set times, and all from the ease of the Wiser Room App on a smart device.

A standard lconic light switch can simply and easily become a smart light switch. It doesn't have to be done at the initial point of installation either. The beauty of the system is you are not locked in. You could decide a couple of years later that 'l'd really like that standard light switch to be smart now' and arrange for an electrician to install the smart mechanism, without too much trouble or cost.

New Wiser Iconic Connected Socket


Then in 2020, we were proud to again add to the Iconic Bluetooth range, offering electricians, builders and homeowners even more choice when it comes to their customers and homes, with the introduction of the (drumroll please) Wiser Iconic Connected Socket. The new Iconic smart outlet comes with in-built Bluetooth connectivity and runs off the same PDL Wiser Room app as the other Iconic Bluetooth offers. It allows homeowners to use a run-on timer, or set up to 16 different schedules for appliances that they don't necessarily want on all the time, such as gaming systems, TVs, Wi-Fi routers (those of you with teenage kids I can hear your minds whirring) or even irons and electric blankets.

The lconic smart socket is a double switched 10A horizontal connected socket. The left and right-hand side outlets can be controlled independently, giving you choice in terms of how you want to use it. There is a touch actioned pairing button in the middle of the two outlets with an LED indicator light. Once paired to your smart device the LED arrows on the button will indicate whether the right or left-hand side sockets, or both sockets are in use.

The outlets also come standard with safety shutters, to offer added protection against electrical risks. The dolly rockers







are identified with text saying "OFF" and "SMART" so you can clearly identify the mode of the outlet. When in "SMART" mode, you will be able to use the Wiser Room App to set run out timers, schedules or simply control whether you want it on or off, when within range. When in "OFF" mode it disables any app control, schedules or timers. As with a standard outlet, off means off.

Pairing to the socket is simple. Open up the PDL Wiser Room app on your smart device. Ensure Bluetooth function is enabled. Simply touch the middle touch switch three times. Both LEDs should flash rapidly for 30 seconds, and then the app will give you instructions on how to pair. Once paired it will be discoverable on the app under "Socket". From there you can use settings to label the appliance and add schedules or timer functions as you wish.

They are straightforward for an electrician to install, as they use standard wiring and are compatible with most standard flush boxes and brackets. The Bluetooth mechanism is in-built into the outlet, so in terms of ordering it is simply the Connected Socket Grid (PDL395CSG), and then the Iconic Skin cover of choice, so 2 parts.

The benefits stack up

The benefits of smart home technology in terms of energy efficiency and power savings can really add up over time. According to Energy Efficiency and Conservation Authority (EECA), an average household spends \$175 a year to run a towel rail continuously, but you could easily save \$115 if you used a timer to only have them on for eight hours a day.

Using existing and affordable Bluetooth technology to simplify scheduling a heated towel rail to automatically turn on and off for homeowners, whilst continuing to give them the control to adjust and change the timings to suit their ever-changing lifestyles seems to be a practical way forward. With many homes with 2 or 3 bathrooms now, these savings could very quickly add up. For many Kiwis having a full home automation system isn't practical or what they actually need. They might simply want to turn one device on or off, or they may just want a countdown timer on their bathroom fan or a particular wall socket. There will be instances where a fully connected home is the best solution, but when someone just wants a few things to be smart, Bluetooth connected switches, timers and powerpoints might be the best answer.

If you had told me 20 years ago, that I would be championing the cause for the adoption of smart home technology in New Zealand, I probably would have laughed in your face. But even us more mature folk can change our opinion and 'move with the times', especially when we can see the obvious benefits it can have for our customers, power management and the environment in the long term.

THE HEADWATERS ECOLODGE A PIONEER IN SUSTAINABILITY

The Headwaters Eco Lodge is New Zealand and the world's first visitor accommodation to be designed, built and operating based on regenerative design principles to Living Building Challenge (LBC) standards.



Recognised globally as the most stringent design principles for creating a healthy future where our planet and humanity are thriving, the lodge has been certified by the International Living Future Institute for its inspiring and regenerative approach to energy, water, materials and beauty.

The LBC uses a flower metaphor to reflect a healthy living entity where the building is rooted in place while generating its own energy, collecting its own water, supporting its local ecosystem and community (via pollination), and becoming food for the local ecosystem at the end of its life.

And like a flower, it should all look beautiful. The 'petals' of the flower are woven throughout the guest experience, with premium eco-chalets, the main lodge building and an outdoor Scheelite Shelter being sustainably constructed to enhance light, mountain views, and year-round comfort using repurposed and nontoxic construction materials, lush native plantings, and a visual bounty of beautiful locally commissioned artwork.

Recycled building materials include three local woolsheds, the auctioneers platform from the old Dunedin Stockyard, and materials from buildings damaged in the 2011 Christchurch earthquake. Local rock from the Dart and Rees rivers has been used to create the Braided River stone mosaic flooring in the Homestead building. "The lodge has gone beyond the basics of its carbon footprint, by creating a sense of place by adding cultural and natural history stories and curated local craft and art, so our guests can learn about the region even when inside our buildings," says Debbi Brainerd who purchased the property with co-founder husband Paul ten years ago.

The Brainerds want guests to experience authenticity and connection to the local people and culture of the region with warm welcoming interior spaces.

"Our environment enables guests to relax, refocus, and nourish their minds and bodies which is what we all need for our creativity to flow. The extra bonus for businesses and all our guests is knowing that all our profits support the local Glenorchy Community Trust," says Debbi.

Environmental credentials

The Lodge has an annual net positive status and uses 50% less water than similar facilities, setting a commendable example. The installation of 589 solar photovoltaic panels, including some translucent ones makes it one of the South Island's largest solar gardens. The panels were installed in 2015 and most panels are 340W, with the exception of some translucent panels which are 170W.

Generating an average of 210MWh

per year is quite impressive, especially considering the variability the weather can introduce. The Lodge is embracing sustainable practices not only in energy generation but also in infrastructure, such as using non-toxic cables in accordance with the Living Building Challenge. Having 8km of underground cable powering multiple facilities, including The Lodge, Mrs Woolly's General Store and the Campground, demonstrates a comprehensive approach to sustainable energy management.

All toilets are compostable but no, they don't smell. There's a sophisticated system which means a sensor-controlled fan automatically sucks air down when being used.

Thanks to Paul's highly technical skills, there's an underground complex circular waste management and water system that turns all used grey and black water into irrigation water through the three gravity fed constructed wetlands. The buildings meet Net Positive Energy certification using SIPs panels, ground source heating, fresh air exchange units, daylighting and LED lighting throughout. A little more on our Smart Wiring Automation System; all light fixtures use LED bulbs – highly efficient when turned on, and many lights within the Lodge's buildings automatically turn off when there is no-one in the room. In total the Lodge has in excess of 1800 sensors onsite!

Exterior lighting is also automated, providing safety and illumination for visitors while respecting Glenorchy's rural landscape (and future Dark Sky accreditation plans!) by avoiding unnecessary light pollution.

Last but not least, an impressive kitchen garden, winterised greenhouse and orchard produces fresh produce served daily to guests at breakfast and dinners at the lodge. Alongside the growing, the Headwaters has recently commissioned a large public community composting station for the local township.

HOW TO PLA BUNKER SHOT FROM WET COMPACTED SAND

Here are a few tips to help you become proficient when playing this shot over the coming winter months.

n wet conditions, when the sand has become more compacted, avoid opening the clubface as you would normally do when playing a standard greenside bunker shot from dry/ fluffy sand.

Instead, keep the clubface "square" to your target so as not to add to the amount of "bounce" already built into the sole of your club (Adding "bounce" is detrimental when playing from wet/compacted sand - doing so prevents the leading edge of the club from digging into the sand to create the "explosion" required to propel your ball out of the hazard).

Select a sand-wedge with little

bounce or even practice playing this shot with a pitching wedge (which has even less bounce than a sand-wedge).

- Place most of the weight on your front foot – this will help you create a steeper downswing. Keep the weight here throughout the motion.
- Position the ball just forward of centre in your stance and aim to impact the sand about an inch behind the ball. Make sure to accelerate the club through the sand upon impact.
- Plan for the ball to come out faster, carry further and stop more quickly than it would do from dry sand.

Schneider Gelectric Life Is On



Former Manu Samoa No 10 and freelance rugby scribe Campbell Burnes saw an England side throwing off the proverbial shackles during the Six Nations.

here was a time, not too long ago, in fact, when England's rugby was synonymous with kick and chase, kick and clap, even.

Eddie Jones tried to inculcate a more fearless, aggressive approach to rugby during his turbulent tenure, but he was gone by the end of 2022.

In came Steve Borthwick at the helm and the early results were hardly promising. After a sluggish fourth position in the 2023 Six Nations, England's Pre-Rugby World Cup form was catastrophically bad. But somehow, it made it through to the semifinal and, if Handre Pollard had been astray from the tee, then the Red Rose would have reached a fifth decider against all odds.

The first three 2024 Six Nations outings hardly boded well, scratchy wins over Italy and Wales and failing to regain the Calcutta Cup from Scotland. Borthwick's



men were employing a blitz defence, under Felix Jones, which seemed to be hit or miss.

Then came the 'eureka' moment for England, edging the world's No 1-ranked team, Ireland, 23-22 at Twickers in bold and brilliant fashion. Led by outstanding No 8 Ben Earl, the England pack rediscovered its mojo and that allowed the backs to cut free. There was no Owen Farrell, so George Ford was pulling the strings, and he looks more likely than the physical Farrell to ignite his outsides. Marcus Smith can chime in off the bench with maximum impact. The midfield of Ollie Lawrence and Henry Slade is not quite at the Nonu-Smith level yet, but it's a step up from the days when Mike Tindall played upwards of 70 Tests. Poor old Tindall... decent bloke, good tackler, great snoz, slow as a carthorse on attack.

Now there's a cutting edge to England's attack and a desire to utilise the speed on the outside of George Furbank, Tommy Freeman and Immanuel Feyi-Waboso. The latter is just 21, so why wouldn't you use his pace and potency?

Against Ireland, England played with pace, confidence and, above all, verve. The latter is a hard to define word that does not guarantee victory but does guarantee that you will go down with all guns blazing. This is what transpired in Lyon a week later when France nudged them out 33-31. But it was a cracker of a match in which England did all but cause a second shock in seven days.

This may be England rugby's 'Bazball' moment, when it works out that it does have the personnel to be entertaining and win in the process. If they hold fast to these new-found principles, it should make them a far more compelling watch.

So let us hope that, when Borthwick's men hit these shores in July, they do not retreat into their well-worn shells. They have found a better way to play rugby, should they retain most of the Six Nations roster for the tour to New Zealand.

In early February, you could easily have chalked up a 2-0 series victory for Razor's first All Blacks. Now, the odds may have tightened on a 1-1 draw, with the W coming in Dunedin, as the second Test is at Fortress Eden Park. 🜌

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EXANS DAVE MCLEOD - MOTORING WRITER

With a career spanning more than two decades, Schumacher's impact on the sport goes far beyond his seven World Championships, he's an icon who forever changed the face of racing.

Born to working-class parents, Schumacher started his racing career in karting, winning his first karting championship aged six in a kart built from discarded parts, and essentially never looked back.

He made his F1 debut with Jordan-Ford team at the Belgian Grand Prix in 1991, and completed his final race with Mercedes in 2012, (retiring for the second time), and during that time notched up 300 Grand Prix races (the second driver in history to do so), and held numerous records including most Grand Prix wins (91 - one short of the combined win totals of Ayrton Senna and Alain Prost), 68 pole positions, and 77 fastest laps, to name but a few. Sure, some of his records have been broken since, but his 100% podium finish in 2002 remains.

Beyond his exceptional driving abilities, it was Schumacher's mental fortitude and unrelenting work ethic that set him apart. Known for his meticulous preparation, he would spend countless hours analysing data, studying rival drivers, and perfecting his skills. Every race weekend, he inspired his team with his unwavering determination and dedication, and despite numerous setbacks and challenges, he always found a way to bounce back stronger, proving that success is often a product of resilience and focus. Schumacher brought Formula 1 into the mainstream, (even moreso in Germany), captivating millions of fans around the world and propelling the sport to new heights. He also played a crucial role in developing the technology and safety standards that have since become integral to the sport, such as the first lightweight carbon fibre reinforced polymer helmet. Additionally, his influence inspired a new generation of drivers such as Sebastian Vettel, several of whom went on to achieve remarkable success.

In 2013, an unfortunate skiing accident left Schumacher with severe brain injuries.

Since then, he has been on a long and challenging road to recovery. While details of his condition still remain private, the continuing support from fans and the racing community demonstrates the lasting impression he has had on the lives of many.

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

A HISTORY OF VIEW OF THE BOARD

When you first look at a dartboard the thing that confuses most people is why the numbers are set out the way they are. The answer is similar to the reason that the keys on a keyboard are not in alphabetical order.

There are various theories about why the letters on a keyboard are mixed as they are, the most common (not necessarily correct) being that the original mechanical action of the typewriter type bars was likely to jam if too many keys were typed too quickly while being too close to each other, so it was designed to slow down typists. The QWERTY keyboard was patented in 1878, but by 1893 it was the accepted standard, and has never been successfully challenged.

In the early days as the dartboard evolved a few layout options were offered, though the sequence of numbers commonly seen in international competition has been the accepted standard since the National Darts Association was formed in London in 1925. Early dartboards had only 12 segments with scores being multiples of 5, until in 1913 the 20 segments appeared, but originally with no treble ring and only a single bullseye. This evolved into the board we see today with the addition of the treble ring and outer bull.

Sadly there is no definitive source explaining how the number sequence came about, though there have been many theories as to why it makes sense. The official line of thought is they were placed in such a way as to encourage accuracy, as you will notice most of the larger numbers are flanked by smaller ones, so if you miss when you aim for a big number you are unlikely to be "lucky" enough to hit another big number. They don't necessarily follow a pattern and alternatives have been suggested, but just as the keyboard letter sequence became a standard because so many had used it for so long that it became too hard to change, the dartboard number sequence has been standardised as it is for nearly a century.

There was a short period when the standard game could have changed dramatically with the introduction of a "quad" ring which was added between the triple ring and bullseye, scoring quadruple points. Even though Harrows made a short production run of this board (1992 - 2000) and it was used in the WDC UK Matchplay from 1993 - 1996 it didn't catch on and has not been used in a professional event since. They have become quite a collectors item though, so grab it if you happen across one for sale somewhere, so far none of the manufacturers have been interested in resurrecting them.

As for the construction of the board the first boards were made from log ends of elm which needed soaking daily to soften them, or plasticine which needed to be smoothed after each leg with a warm iron which caused a terrible smell. The original bristle boards were marketed by the Nodor Company in 1935, the name of which came from the words No Odor from the invention in 1919 of plasticine that didn't smell. Nodor first marketed the (not so smelly) plasticine dartboard in 1923 and the idea of a bristle board came about in 1932 made from rope ends. Since then sisal has been the fibre of choice for dartboard construction, with 3.7 million fibres compressed tightly into a flat round disc before being sanded and screen printed. Sisal comes from agave leaves, the same plant that is used to make Tequila, though you won't get drunk by sucking on a dartboard. Between dartboards, rope, Tequila, and it's sweet syrup the agave plant has become quite popular to farm.

You'll probably recognise a few names on dartboards if you watch darts on TV or frequent the various social drinking establishments. Common names are Harrows, Unicorn, Shot, Puma and Winmau (pronounced "win more"). The name Winmau was derived from the name of the founders wife, Winifred Maud Kicks. Harry Kicks started out making elm dartboards in 1945 until the technology arrived to make paper coil boards in the '50s. When the Nodor patent expired in the early '60s Kicks started making bristle boards and the quality was such that the British Darts Organisation (BDO) signed up the Kicks dartboards in 1973 to be the official boards of the organisation. A few years later the name changed to Winmau, and in 2002 Nodor bought out the brand. Nodor still produces top quality boards under the Winmau name and signed a 5 year deal in 2022 with the Professional Darts Corporation (PDC) to supply boards for all their tournaments.

No other style of beer has spawned more sub-variants than India Pale Ale.

rom its origins as the extra strong and hoppy 'beer concentrate' brewed to last the trip from Britain to India, IPA has evolved into a myriad of different styles. Everything from Black IPA, to the industry shaking Hazy, stems from that one common ancestor. Now the strain has mutated once again, giving rise to the new Cold IPA style. A clean, lite and decisively hop focused approach to this classic beer.

This is achieved by making one of the most significant breaks from the core style ever, swapping traditional ale yeast for lager, and undergoing the same cold fermentation as the latter, meaning that while it is still referred to as an ale, Cold IPA is technically a lager beer.

This slower, gentler fermentation process combined with significant use of more neutral grains like rice and corn, produces the uniquely clean and light body that typifies the style.

With this extra smooth and neutral malt base, even more focus can be cast on the hop characters than ever before.

This doesn't just mean 'more hops' which has been IPA's principle mantra since its

inception. Rather, the intrinsically drier malt flavour means that hops can be explored in entirely new ways than before, focusing on more nuanced and fragile aromas and flavours that would previously be drowned out by the richer malt body, or the higher bitterness required to offset it. These beers can be aptly described as the closest thing to anti-hazies that we have, which has proven a compelling prospect to the increasingly large camp of drinkers finding themselves over that scene dominating style.

While Cold IPA is still a style very much in its nascent development, the last few months of releases have more definitely started to indicate that brewers are becoming more comfortable with this latest addition to the pantheon, with releases beginning to show a clear and distinct identity. Here are some recent highlights which best typify everything that Cold IPA is, and the direction of future releases yet to be.

HOP FEDERATION: 'Between The Lines' 5.8%abv

Utilising the developmental hop 'NZH-101' this release from Hop Fed is a modern beer on all accounts. It's also one of lightest of the new Cold IPA's, in both %ABV and the ethereal nature of its flavours. A nimble and gracefully aromatic beer, with delicately pungent herbal character mixed with fragile floral tones.


BACH BREWING: 'Blizzard of hops' 6.5%abv

Fully embracing its mixed lager bloodline, using a Bohemian yeast that accentuates its smooth and grainy malt backbone, makes Blizzard one of the weightier recent examples of Cold IPA. Still significantly hop driven with it's broad mix of NZ and US varietals, this more explicitly lager focused release should make


headway with the Steinlager purists.

EPIC BREWING: 'Rooster' 6.3%abv

As described, Cold IPA's gentle character leaves them with less need of the traditionally big IPA bitterness. But, in true Epic fashion, they wondered what would happen if they instead dialled the bitterness even higher... The result is one of the most impactfully bitter IPA's in recent years. One for the true IBU thrill seekers. 🜌



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THIS JAGUAR XK120 IS A ROAD LEGAL KIN RACING LEGEND

Any Jaguar XK120 is special. Built from 1948 to 1954, the XK120 was the car which made Jaguar as we know it today. With its XK straight six and gorgeous flowing lines, the XK120 quickly became the must-have accessory for all tycoons and celebrities, such as Clark Gable and Frank Sinatra.

The XK120 also saw its fair share of action on the global motorsport stage. Le Mans, the Ulster Tourist Trophy and the Monte Carlo Rally were all the stomping ground for this new cat. While XKs like the famous Monte NUB120 took all the sporting headlines, one competition XK120 in New Zealand gained all manner of attention from Kiwi racing fans throughout the fifties and sixties. Called the Silcock/Middlemass XK120 racer, it is one very special car.

The car, rego AL6246, was bought new by Dave Silcock from Ron Sylvester's Sydneham Park Car Sales in 1950 for 375 pounds. Chassis number #660534 indicated it was the 534th RHD XK120 built. Silcock bought with intentions to use it as a road car. However, this changed after a trip to Ruapuna Speedway outside of Christchurch. After seeing the local sports car class competing in earnest, Silcock decided he had the perfect machine for the job. He decided to take his new Jag racing.

He had some wind deflectors made for aerodynamics and fitted a side exhaust system with all the silencing removed. Before you could say "Coventry", Silcock was competing in his first racing event. He also won it. Silcock then began to modify the XK straight six by boring it out and fitting front disc brakes, drilled disc wheels and a limited slip diff. Thanks to these sporting additives, Silcock was able to win the South Island Sports Production Class with it.

AL6246 saw much success in events like the Waimate 50. It was eventually acquired by Brian Middlemass. Under Brian's ownership, the modifications took over and the Jag became even more of a weapon. Brian once wrote "when purchased by me, it was probably one of the roughest XKs in New Zealand, having been rolled twice and apart from considerable body damage, was missing many mechanical and hard to get parts such as lights, bumpers, windscreen and interior trim."

In went a 3.8L straight six from a then modern-day E-Type bored out to 3.9L. Also added were triple side draught Dell'Orto carburettors, 9.5 to 1 compression pistons, torsion bars from an XK150, a four-speed gearbox with overdrive from a MK2, uprated rear shocks, flared rear guards, extra bonnet vents, leather bonnet strap, a lightened flywheel, wire wheels and a special Laycock clutch and plenty of other tweaks and adjustments.

The end result was a Jaguar XK120 which produced 300hp and was good for 156mph flat out. Brian was able to record quarter mile run times of 14.5 seconds and was able to lap the original Ruapuna circuit in 53 seconds. Brian's modifications even led to Dave Silcock himself referring to the car as the Middlemass Jaguar, stating "Brian took it much further than I ever did."

Getting into to the XK120 requires a certain technique. The door requires a firm tug on the handle for it to open. Once it swings out you can clamber aboard and slot yourself gently down into the cockpit. After a while of moving my lanky legs about, I was set. Its hard to imagine running to this car, leaping in and driving off at speed like the traditional Le Mans start. But they managed quite easily, whereas I could not.

Anyway, once you are in you sit low with that three-spoke racing steering somewhat close to your chest. With the passenger seat covered by the plate a la Le Mans style and those two half circular wind deflectors in front of you, it does feel like a post war single seater. The pedals are slightly off-set in relation to the wheel so half of you is somewhat anchored sideways but you do get used to this.

Right, time to fire up this piece of New Zealand racing history. With the right amount of choke applied, one turns the ignition key and in typical Jaguar fashion, presses the engine start button. What happened next was nothing short of glorious. Those six cylinders began their cycle and the side draught Dell'Orto carbs began mixing air and petrol. The result, thanks to those modified side exhausts, was an engine note which would trigger Greta Thunberg.

A bit of pedal travel is required to get this road-going endurance car performing its opera at the highest pitch. The sweet sound of a Jaguar six, especially one modified such as this, goes down as one of the all-time great engine noises. The cat was well and truly awake. With the sun beating down, driving gloves and shades on, the time to drive was nigh.

The four-speed manual box requires a positive throw and feels very much like a bolt action Winchester rifle when selecting each gear. Moving off and the lack of power steering becomes blindingly obvious.



First gear, moving off with right foot planted, the revs began to rise. Soon enough, my entire surroundings become engulfed in a deafening bellow from that modified straight six. The small half-moon wind deflector keeps the torrent of wind out of my face but everywhere else gets buffeted by the equivalent of a howling gale.

The revs climbed higher, the noise grew louder, the wind grew more intense, and best of all, the smile on my mug got even bigger. By the time the rev needle reached the red, it was complete joy and bloody loud too. Then shifting into second the process started all over again.

As the white lines on SH1 began to merge into one, the XK120 was all warmed up, but you have no time to relax, you have to get on with the job of driving. The Middlemass/Silcock Jaguar XK120 is not a car which you can just cruise in top gear. It requires total concentration at all times, especially when you come to a corner.

In most cars, you arrive at the corner, apply the necessary amount of braking and navigate your way around the bend with no real effort on your part required. To repeat the same process in this Jag requires so much more.



Take the steering. You can't turn left or right when you arrive at the corner. Instead you actually have to coax it into the corner before you get there. Only then the big cat will be set up right to navigate the bend. Braking and being in the right gear is also paramount. You have to book your time to brake well in advance. Get all of these right and you can make the bend cleanly and safely. If not, out come the white knuckles as you try your hardest to stay clear of that grass verge.

This no-nonsense XK120 is about driving. Proper driving. No creature comforts. No roof. Just you and a machine which demands respect. Every gear change, every touch of the accelerator and brake pedal requires 110 per cent of your attention. This is what driving used to be. Raw and simple.

This Jaguar XK120 racer is hands down one of the most incredible and aweinspiring cars I have ever driven. Whether around the twisty stuff or blasting through North Canterbury, it is such a raw riot of an automobile. For a true dyed in the wool petrolhead, few classic car experiences can equal a drive in the Silcock/ Middlemass Jaguar XK120



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
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KEZZA'S SMOKED SALMON

Over the past 20-or-so years I would hate to think how many kilos of salmon I have smoked! It is a guess but would be in the realms of 100s and 100s and over that time I have served it to some top chefs here in New Zealand and across the ditch and all have given it high praise.

We have recently added smoked salmon to the menu at our barbecue restaurant business as an alternative to those that may not gravitate towards traditional smoked meats like brisket, pulled pork, ribs or lamb and it is proving a winner.

SMOKED SALMON IS A RELATIVELY Complicated process, so let's Get Stuck IN.

Total time: Approx. 1hour

INGREDIENTS:

Salmon (fillet) Natural Maple Syrup (the real stuff) Rum & Que Intensify Garlic Salt Parsley

TOOLS:

Smoker capable of "indirect" cooking Charcoal chimney Coal Briquettes Lump Coal Pohutukawa smoking wood Pin bone pliers (a fine needle nose will do) Fillet knife Grease proof baking paper

METHOD:

Set up your smoker for indirect cooking and light up around 15 briquettes.

If not "pin boned" already, you will need to use pin bone pliers and identify any rows of bones present and remove them from the fillet. I use the plier to grasp the bone, then with a gentle "pulling-shaking" motion lift the bones out.

Sprinkle a fine coating of Rum & Que Intensify to the fillet or portion, and gently rub for even coverage.

Apply maple syrup for an even coverage and again gently rub on to fillet.

Sprinkle a small amount of garlic **1** salt and set aside.

Add the lit coals to your smoker 6. Add the fit coals to year pohutukawa smoking wood directly on top of coals.

Lay down a suitable size piece of grease proof paper directly on to the grill but away from the heat (indirect) and place your prepared salmon onto the paper - close the lid. You should see a clean "white" smoke leaving the exhaust vent.

After 35mins in, start up a decent amount of lump coal in your chimney and get that "roaring" hot.

After 45mins add the lump coal 9. to your smoker (indirect), sprinkle salmon with parsley for colour and close the lid. You should see a rapid rise in pit temp.

At 1hour check you are happy with the colour of the salmon, the sugars in the maple should have caramelised and look divine.

Remove the salmon from the smoker and serve immediately as part of a meal or on a platter, alternatively cool, refrigerate for later use. Goes great with eggs bene, on bagels with cream cheese, in a salad, in a dip, in sushi.... basically get creative - smoked salmon just works!! 🜌

Until next time - keep the fires burning.



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


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
